Behind Closed Doors

To her neighbors and friends, Emma and Steve seem to be the perfect couple. After graduating from college, they found good jobs, and purchased their "forever home" a few years later. Three beautiful daughters soon followed in rapid succession. With Emma charming their guests, and Steve at the barbeque, their annual Fourth of July bash is a neighborhood favorite.

But Emma has a secret. Behind closed doors, she is a battered woman, whose "perfect" husband controls nearly every aspect of her life and inflicts pain if she disappoints him.

No one else knows.

Domestic Violence is happening to people you know and care about ... your extended family, friends, and coworkers. It happens across all neighborhoods, income and educational levels, races, and ethnicities.

One in four women in Nebraska will experience domestic violence, and it's estimated that 70% of victims never report their abuse.

As she contemplates leaving Steve, Emma faces barriers that feel absolutely overwhelming. Like most batterers, Steve uses tactics that form a web of coercion, control and pain — nearly invisible to onlookers, but strong and terrifying.

And that's where Friendship Home comes in. We are here for victims like Emma and her children...for all victims ... when things are at their worst, with comprehensive services and compassionate

From the Executive Director

Fractured, Hailey sat in the hospital room waiting to be discharged. It was not just her cheekbone and ribs that were broken — it was her spirit. One thing became clear: she wanted to live. For the sake of the children, she had tried to stay. She thought she could manage her husband's brutality by controlling the circumstances that triggered his violence, but she now realized that was impossible.

Hailey called the Friendship Home crisis line from the hospital and spoke with one of our advocates. Working together, they determined Friendship Home's communal shelter would be the safest place for her to make plans for their future. While her husband was at work, she packed their suitcases, picked up Olivia and Bryson from school, and took the first courageous step to rebuilding their lives: she came to Friendship Home.

Given the level of violence Hailey experienced, she worked with staff to begin the process of applying for a protection order while children's advocates helped get the kids settled in and gave them a tour of the shelter. Olivia and Bryson were thrilled to see the basketball hoop; a spirited game ensued while Mom was making life-changing decisions inside.

Friendship Home's advocates know how dangerous it is for a woman to leave her batterer and they work alongside victims to support them in charting their course for a safer future. We cannot thank you enough for sustaining lifesaving resources for families like Hailey's. Thank you for providing hope they can feel.

In 2018, the federal branch of Housing and Urban Development provided funds to launch our Rapid ReHousing (RRH) program to serve up to six families. RRH is designed specifically to help victims of domestic violence access permanent housing. It is also a great example of the many ways our community helps battered women find the firm footing they need to move out of violence.

In January of this year, Friendship Home received additional funding from Domestic Violence Bonus grant through the Continuum of Care, adding six units — expanding families served from six to 12. With further capacity we are able to help more survivors secure housing that works best for their families.

This program is tenant based, meaning individuals will sign a lease and Friendship Home provides rental assistance and supports women in developing a personal plan for independence and assuming full rental payments. RRH is important because it allows for families to move past the crisis of domestic violence, and homelessness, to work on self-identified goals—to rebuild their lives.

This year, Friendship Home was selected locally to benefit from Two Men and a Truck's Movers for Moms program.



Movers for Moms is a national giving program aimed at assisting moms in need by collecting items for women's and family shelters each spring. At Friendship Home, Mother's Day was extra special as we received 675 items (worth over \$5,000) from 12 different drop-off locations around town to gift to the women and children we serve every day! Donations ranged from everyday necessities of diapers, cleaning supplies, and toiletries to kitchen essentials like mixing bowls and hand towels.
