### From the Executive Director

Has it really been 35 years since that warm June evening when I walked up the driveway for my first shift as an overnight advocate at Friendship Home? Yes, it has! And it's time to retire! At the beginning of 2022, I made the difficult decision to take a step back from my duties as Executive Director before fully retiring on March 30 of this year.

I am grateful for the opportunity to work with courageous women determined to establish a life free from violence. There are committed staff, volunteers, and board members who have become precious friends, and a compassionate community that has rallied around our mission. It has been the opportunity of a lifetime to partner with them to grow Friendship Home from a small shelter with space for just six families to a network of shelters throughout the city with safe space for 51 families at any given time.

But the profound effect of our work over these 35 years is not counted in the number of shelter beds or programs. It is counted in changed lives: a little girl who can concentrate in school rather than worrying about what is happening to Mom at home; a little boy who sleeps securely at night and grows up to be a loving partner and father; a woman who, for the first time, has the ability to see her full potential.

I think of these changed lives times a thousand ... two thousand ... three thousand — all rippling into the future of our community in ways we may never fully imagine.

I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to work with the many people who have made Friendship Home what it is today. I will treasure you always!
