The Silent Epidemic

March is Brain Injury Awareness month and Friendship Home is on the frontlines supporting survivors and raising awareness about the signs, symptoms, and prevalence of brain injuries impacting individuals experiencing violence at the hands of their intimate partners.

A survivor's life can be drastically changed by a brain injury, often in unrecognizable ways. Brain injuries can be a silent barrier to healing from trauma, impacting work, parenting, education, and relationships. Many survivors are often blamed for their own trauma that a brain injury leaves, like Carrie, a strangulation survivor.

"I felt as stupid as he always told me I was. Little did I know, my forgetfulness, my 'faults' he claimed I had, were caused by his hands. I didn't know a brain injury was an outcome that could occur from the violence that was inflicted on me. Friendship Home's brain injury screen brought me the answers I needed to move forward in my life and overcome the trauma." – Carrie, survivor

The head, neck, and face are most likely to sustain an injury in a physically violent relationship. From punching and kicking, to being hit with a blunt object or being slammed against a hard surface, all can cause a Traumatic Brain Injury. Strangulation, otherwise known as choking, is a common occurrence of violence perpetrated on a partner with the potential to cause Hypoxic Brain Injury. If strangulation occurs in a relationship, the abuser is *seven times* more likely to kill their partner.

At Friendship Home, every survivor receives educational information and is offered a brain injury screen to assess risk. The information is vital to survivors and includes signs, symptoms, and guidance on when and where to seek medical care. Building awareness and informing our community about the risk is critical for those suffering from brain injury to receive appropriate intervention and care.

From the Executive Director

The phone rings through to our crisis line. An advocate answers: the woman on the other end says her name is Sariah, and she is looking for shelter. Sariah, at first, is afraid to share her story; she said she had never told anyone this before and was worried that no one would believe her. The advocate was patient with Sariah, allowing for moments of tears and silence when needed. After a short time passed, Sariah began to open up. She told the advocate that her husband of 13 years had been physically abusing her almost daily. Sariah shared that the abuse started years ago with lots of namecalling, putting her down about her appearance, and not allowing her to spend time with her loved ones.

The week before Sariah called Friendship Home, her husband was furious because Sariah had been talking on the phone to her mom. He became escalated very quickly and began to assault her physically. Sariah said that for the first time, he put his hands around her neck, strangling her, she couldn't breathe, and at one point, she believed she had lost consciousness. Sariah told the advocate that she feared for her life and did not want her children to grow up without their mom.

During the last half of 2022, Friendship Home had 198 requests for shelter. When a survivor calls seeking refuge, there is a conversation that happens between them and the advocate on the phone. Every survivor is asked if their partner has tried to choke or strangle them. Of those 198 requests, 63% answered yes. There has been an increase in this number over the years, which is unsettling.

At Friendship Home, our services truly are life-saving for women such as Sariah. Thank you for your continued dedication and support of our mission!

Getting ahead is a step-by-step financial class to help survivors evaluate their past money struggles and help them create a solid foundation to start building toward the future they want. This class helps



participants understand the struggles and barriers they have experienced, and how to overcome those barriers, allowing them to learn skills and change their future for the better.

Each week, Muchacho's prepared a meal of tacos/ nachos for 30 individuals, week after week! They included an array of queso, salsas, chips, tortillas, and two different kinds of meat. The comforting food that Muchachos offered allowed our survivors to focus on the class they were taking and move forward in building their futures.

Muchachos is a staple in the Lincoln community, bringing in lines of individuals for their delicious food. Dedicated to tradition, Muchachos treats all its customers as family.
