# Support Found at Friendship Home

For over 45 years, Friendship Home has been dedicated to providing essential services to domestic violence survivors and their children. In recent years, we have witnessed a rise in the number of survivors we serve. The need for housing is complicated and impacts all Nebraskans.

Access to emergency shelter and long-term housing options is vital for survivors seeking safety. Friendship Home recognizes this reality and works hard to support survivors in finding safe housing. As part of the Lincoln Homeless Coalition and Continuum of Care, we join with community partners to fulfill an essential role. Over the past decade, we have expanded our services, piloting individualized, trauma-informer single-family shelters, increasing transitional housing, and launching survivor-leased rapid rehousing. The daily number of survivors served at Friendship Home has doubled during this time frame. In 2013, an average of 62 adults and children were sheltered at Friendship Home each night. Last year, we had an average of 128 adults and children staying with us.

Housing is not the only support a survivor needs to leave an abusive partner. A survivor's journey is unique – our systems need to be flexible to truly support survivors who flee violence. Safety planning, financial safety, access to childcare, and much more are needed while finding freedom. We will continue to work alongside community partners as we build pathways to safety and stability across our community.
