Community Involvement During Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Understanding Domestic Violence Awareness Month requires a deep dive into the significance of this observance and its impact on communities. October is dedicated to raising awareness about domestic violence, a pervasive issue that affects countless individuals regardless of age, gender, or socioeconomic status. This month serves as an important reminder of the ongoing struggles faced by survivors and the critical need for widespread education and support.

Throughout October, various organizations and communities engage in activities designed to shed light on the realities of domestic violence. Events such as Safe Quarters, an event hosted by Friendship Home each October, provide tangible ways for community members to contribute positively and support those affected. This one-day event, taking place on October 13, expands Friendship Home's reach, spreading awareness to individuals unaware of the services Friendship Home offers.

We are searching for volunteers to participate in Safe Quarters! Lincoln is a large city, and we want to reach every household within its limits. Registering a team in your neighborhood will include more than just collecting donations. As a volunteer, you will receive the proper materials to accurately spread information about Friendship Home and domestic violence. Over 500 volunteers mobilize annually across neighborhoods, engaging with residents and collecting donations directly benefiting Friendship Home. This



collective effort highlights the importance of a united community response to domestic violence, ensuring that survivors have access to safe shelter, counseling services, and other vital resources.

Safe Quarters has achieved great things for Friendship Home over the last 22 years, none of which would have been possible without the incredible support of our community, donors, volunteers, and dedicated staff! COMPREHENSIVE ADVOCACY SERVICES RECEIVED AT FRIENDSHIP HOME

Friendship Home offers safe shelter, transitional housing, rapid rehousing, and supportive services to empower survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Our trauma-informed, survivor-centered approach focuses on safety and resilience, recognizing and building on each survivor's strengths. By providing comprehensive, knowledgeable care, Friendship Home supports survivors' overall health and well-being as they take steps toward safety and stability.

From the Executive Director

Lincoln is a city brimming with potential and opportunities. Yet, we continue to face significant challenges in providing safe and confidential shelter to those in urgent need. Friendship Home serves an average of 128 survivors daily, including their children. Despite our efforts to expand services, the demand for our support continues to grow.

Friendship Home recently participated in a community Survivor Needs Assessment to better understand and address these needs. This assessment, which took place from January 2023 to February 2024, was facilitated by Dr. Toni Jensen and supported by Lancaster County Human Services, Woods Charitable Fund, and the Lincoln Community Foundation.

Based on the assessment findings, we actively collaborate with community partners to implement several key recommendations. These include improving domestic violence-specific housing resources to meet state and national standards, enhancing staff resiliency, securing sustainable funding, and fostering ongoing collaboration and communication. By focusing on these areas, we aim to reduce barriers and elevate the experiences of survivors in our community.

Our commitment to these goals reflects our dedication to ensuring that every individual in need has access to safe and confidential shelter when needed. As we continue to work towards these objectives, we are optimistic about the positive impact we can achieve for survivors in Lincoln.
